Ch. 4 “What Lies Behind the Law” pp. 21-27

p. 21 Lewis tends to divide views of the universe into a materialist view and what he calls a “religious” view, roughly along the lines of intelligent design. Consider the strengths and weaknesses of materialism and intelligent design.

p. 22 Lewis makes some statements about the nature of scientific inquiry which could be considered inflammatory. Evaluate his thumbnail sketch of the scientific process.

p. 23 Evaluate Lewis' conclusion that science is not able to determine causality or non-causality.

p. 24 Lewis argues that an intelligent creator/designer could not be found within nature because it would have to stand outside the created order. Evaluate this argument.

p. 23 Evaluate Lewis' statement, "we know that men find themselves under a moral law, which they did not make, and cannot quite forget even when they try, and which they know they ought to obey."

At the end of the chapter Lewis makes it clear that he has not yet spoken of the Christian version of the deity. Evaluate whether or not this is actually the case.
