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#### June 2022 Both Inclusive and Exclusive

Psalm 133 reflects on how good it is when God's people are together in unity. There's a great kind of togetherness we can find when we are united. And it's something many in our world need, desperately. While all the forces in our contemporary society try to pull us apart and isolate us, we realize that isolation and radical individualism almost always cause harm, not benefit. How do we fix these problems? By working for togetherness, happiness, and harmony.

Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity! It is like the precious oil upon the head, running down on the beard, the beard of Aaron, running down on the edge of his garments. It is like the dew of Hermon, descending upon the mountains of Zion; for there the LORD commanded the blessing – life forevermore. Psalm 133, NKJV

There's one big problem in that. Drawing people together is only a partial solution to isolation. It's often been said that the loneliest place and time on the planet is Times Square on New Year's Eve. Why? There's a huge crowd there, such a big crowd that every individual can be anonymous. You may be united with everyone in the group in a certain way, but you are still able to be the very same, unhappy, isolated self you were the day before and will be the next day.

There is one boay and one Spirit, just as you were called in one hope of your calling; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all. Ephesians 4:4-6, NKJV Psalm 133 says specifically that the unity which is blessed by God is a unity of God's people. In his letter to the Ephesians, chapter four, the apostle Paul lists several ways that Christians are united. Among other things, they have one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all. This is where the unity comes in.

While Christianity is inclusive, confessing that Jesus died to draw all sorts of people from all nations to himself, we are also exclusive. How's that? Historic Christianity is going to insist on some specific teachings and beliefs which identify us, which distinguish us from just everyone. There's one Lord, Jesus. He's the only one who can save us by taking our sins upon himself. This is the one faith that we share, a faith which saves us as we trust that Jesus did indeed provide rescue from sin. There's one baptism, which is a specifically Christian washing from sin and a renewal by the Holy Spirit. There's only one true God, the Father of all, the one revealed in the Bible.

In the past year, as our local community has pulled out of the restrictions on gatherings imposed during the pandemic, Wittenberg Door has been able to start gathering people together again. The Gospel of Jesus is present. Many of the people we have been able to assemble have little or no exposure to Christianity in the past. We want to not only bring them together, but bring them together in Christ. That's the final goal of all our activities, to gather people in the blessing of God, with one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and the wonder of being God's people, dwelling together in unity.

## Wittenberg Door Financial Update

So why did you mail this to me? Wittenberg Door Campus Ministry is a ministry of the American Association of Lutheran Churches. We want to be sure that all our churches, pastors, and also our other contributors receive a copy of the newsletter to share, post on a bulletin board, or otherwise make public. Our work has an impact on the eternal destiny of the collegiate communities in Columbia, Missouri. We want to invite everyone to participate through prayers and giving! Over the past two years, Pastor Spotts has served an area LC-MS congregation on a part time basis. This has not only helped the local church through a time of vacancy and their own discernment process, it has also provided a salary which allowed for ongoing campus ministry work on a part time basis.

The local church has now called a pastor! It's time for Pastor Spotts to dedicate his full time and attention to developing the work of Wittenberg Door Campus Ministry. To keep providing face-to-face in-person ministry to all the students, faculty, staff, and administrators on the campuses in Columbia, we need to concentrate on gathering a

budget that will be able to support the work in the long run. Generation after generation of scholars will be passing through the community. They need to be introduced to Jesus!

The "Wittenberg Door 300" is our group of regular contributors. With the average monthly contribution of \$50, if we have three hundred contributors we will be fully funded to have a full-time pastor, whatever office assistance we need, and to conduct many activities on campus to bring the Gospel to all who will hear. We're still short of that goal. With your help we know we can accomplish great things for Christ!

I'm now taking every opportunity to introduce the work to church congregations and remind them that we are here on the campuses as part of their work of outreach to the world. Though many of the routine operating expenses of WDCM have been covered by generous giving, we have not been able to reach the point of providing housing, health care, or a salary for Pastor

Spotts. As you can imagine, this is a significant part of our budget. Please consider stepping forward with support.
